Record number of student athletes recognized at Red and Black reception

More than 400 UofL student athletes were honored as Red and Black Scholars for maintaining a cumulative 3.25 or better grade-point average. Provost Shirley Willihnganz addressed the student athletes, each of whom invited to the reception a faculty member who has had a significant impact on their academic success.

To enhance the classroom performance of all student athletes, in late February UofL broke ground on the new Thorntons Academic Center for Excellence at the south end of Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.





Energy-saving project extended

The University of Louisville's Board of Trustees voted to extend an existing contract with Siemens Industry Inc. that has saved UofL \$12.9 million in energy costs in six years. UofL and Siemens began working together in 2009 to save energy on the university's three campuses. More efficient lighting, updated heating and cooling systems and water use reduction in 88 campus buildings with a total area of 6.2 million square feet account for the cost savings.

"We've saved a lot of money through this initiative and become more energy efficient at the same time," said UofL President James Ramsey. "We've learned we can reap even more savings by extending this project."

FirstBuild earns GLI award

The University of Louisville and GE Appliances teamed up to create the microfactory FirstBuild, which opened last July. Greater Louisville Inc. recognized FirstBuild for its innovative promise with a Silver Fleur De Lis Award at its 2015 Annual Meeting. The microfactory engages a community of industrial designers, scientists, engineers, makers and early adopters to fast-track product prototyping, iteration and introduction. Earlier in February, FirstBuild debuted its first community-created, community-funded product, the Paragon induction cooktop.
